

Music

The purpose of the music curriculum at Cornwallis Academy is to expose students to a highly practical approach, being inspired by Musical Futures pedagogy. Students are involved in listening, singing, and performing from day one. Theoretical knowledge is used to support the practical learning, as well as explore how a variety of cultures have shaped a wide range of musical styles and traditions. Students will deepen their understanding of 'how' by playing with accuracy and expression, improvise and compose using different structures, scales, and tonalities, explore a range of notations and develop a deeper understanding of a wide range of key musicians and composers through listening and appraising. Students will develop confidence and resilience as well as self-discipline and teamwork.

Students learn how to play keyboard, guitar and drums and use these skills to play together in ensemble settings. They learn how to use their voices correctly and body percussion.

In addition to classroom lessons, students can further study an instrument of their choice with through Andrew Parry Music. Currently we offer lessons in singing, piano, drums and guitar.

Year 9 Music

What are the aims and objectives for this term?	Term 1: World Music - Students will explore Music from around the world. Including their own culture and further afield, experiencing music, culture and instruments from Africa, China and India. Term 2: Genres on Shuffle - Students will use their practical skills learning melodies on the keyboards and rhythms using percussion by well-known artists from many different genres of music. Term 3: Reggae Music - Students will develop their listening skills identifying key characteristics such as the rhythm of Caribbean music. Term 4: Self Study Unit 'My Music' - Students study their favourite artist, meticulously researching and producing a PowerPoint which is then presented to peers/cohort. Term 5: Music In the Media - Students will strengthen their knowledge and the importance of music in the media, basing their previous knowledge from film music in year 8. Term 6: GarageBand/Bandlab Recording - Students will use the knowledge they have acquired over the past terms to produce music that includes MIDI input and loops to produce a completed piece of music.
What previous knowledge is required?	No previous knowledge is required. Music teachers appreciate that most students have no prior experience of music.

How will this term's content help with future learning?	The Year 9 Music curriculum will support students in developing performance, compositional, listening and analysis skills. These skills will enable students to become more confident within these areas of study, ready to access the Level 2 Music option in Year 10.
Resources	Watching any videos of performances will allow students to watch professional performers. Professional performances will allow students the opportunity to observe good technique and give them the opportunity to reflect on how further improvements to their skill set can be made. Listening to any genre of music will allow students to develop their ear with regards to analysis. To further develop Music Technology skills at home, there is a vast library of tutorial videos for Garageband and other software products on YouTube, that can be used to further self-teach technology skills.

Assessments	Students are assessed continually by their teacher in the areas of performance, composition, listening analysis and music technology. An assessment point will be carried out once a term, where students will receive a summative grade which sums up the level that they are working at.
